Wars and Rumours of Wars:

Earlier Protests – News reporters standing in front of burning businesses stating the protests were “mainly peaceful”. Then January 6th.

Comotions 181...from 182; instability, i.e. disorder:--commotion, confusion, tumult.

182 ...unstable.

These definitions are from the Oxford Dictionary

Disorder: 1. *n.* a state of confusion.

2. *v.* disrupt the systematic functioning or neat arrangement of.

Usage example - "they are disordering the political landscape"

Commotion: 1. *n.* a state of confused and noisy disturbance. .

2. civil insurrection.

Tumult: 1. *n.* a loud, confused noise, especially one caused by a large mass of people.

2. confusion or disorder.

These definitions are from the Merriam-Webster Dictionary

Tumult: 1. *n* disorderly agitation or milling about of a crowd usually with uproar and confusion of voices : commotion. *b* : a turbulent uprising : riot.

2. hubbub...

Hubub: *n.* 1. a chaotic din caused by a crowd of people. 2. a busy, noisy situation.

Kingdom: 932 basileia, bas-il-i'-ah from 935; properly, royalty, i.e. (abstractly) rule, or (concretely) a realm (literally or figuratively):--kingdom, + reign.

935 *basileus*, *bas-il-yooce'* probably from 939 (through the notion of a foundation of power); a sovereign (abstractly, relatively, or figuratively):--king.

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939 *basis*, *bas'-ece* from *baino* (to walk); a *pace* ("base"), i.e. (by implication) the foot:--foot.

Their path of the establishment factions within the government.

Famines: 3042 *limos*, *lee-mos'* probably from 3007 (through the idea of **destitution**); a scarcity of food:--**dearth**, famine, hunger.

3007 *leipo*, *li'-po* a primary verb; to leave, i.e. (intransitively or passively) to fail or be absent:--be destitute (wanting), lack.

Destitution: Oxford Dictionary *n. poverty so extreme that one lacks the means to provide for oneself.*

Dearth: Oxford Dictionary *n. a scarcity or lack of something.*

Matthew 24:7 ...and pestilences...

Mr 13:8 ... and troubles...

Luke 12:11...and pestilences,...

Pestilences: 3061 *loimos*, *loy'-mos* of uncertain affinity; a plague (literally, the disease, or figuratively, a pest):--pestilence(-t).

Pestilence: Oxford Dictionary *n. a fatal epidemic disease, especially bubonic plague.*

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Pestilence: Merriam-Webster *n.* 1. a contagious or infectious epidemic disease that is virulent and devastating especially: Bubonic Plague 2. **something that is destructive or pernicious**

Yourdictionary.com *n.* 1. a deadly or virulent epidemic disease, bubonic plague.
2. something that is considered harmful, destructive, or evil.

Plague: *n.* 1. a contagious bacterial disease characterized by fever and delirium...2. a contagious disease that spreads rapidly and kills many people. 3. an unusually large number of insects or animals infesting a place and causing damage. 4. used as a curse or an expression of despair or disgust.

v. 1. **cause continual trouble or distress to.** 2. **pester or harass (someone) continually.**

Plague: Merriam-Webster 1: **a disastrous evil or affliction** : calamity. b : a destructively numerous influx or multiplication of a noxious animal : **infestation a plague of locusts.** 2a : an epidemic disease causing a high rate of mortality : pestilence.

Troubles: 5016 *tarache*, *tar-akh-ay'* feminine from 5015; **disturbance**, *i.e.* (of water) roiling, **or (of a mob) sedition**:--trouble(-ing).

5015. *tarassw tarasso*, *tar-as'-so* of uncertain affinity; **to stir or agitate** (roil water):--trouble.

Sedition: *n.* conduct or speech inciting people to rebel against the authority of a state or monarch.

Matthew 24:7...and earthquakes, in divers places...

Mark 13:8 ...and there shall be earthquakes in divers places...

Lu 21:11 And great earthquakes shall be in divers places...

Earthquakes: 578 *seismos*, *sice-mos'* from 4579; a commotion, *i.e.* (of the air) a gale, (of the ground) an earthquake:--earthquake, tempest.

4579 *seio*, *si'-o* apparently a primary verb; to rock (vibrate, properly, sideways or to and fro), *i.e.* (generally) to agitate (in any direction; cause to tremble); figuratively, to throw into a tremor (of fear or concern):--move, quake, shake.

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Luke 21:9 But when ye shall hear of wars and commotions...

Commotion: Oxford Dictionary 1. *n.* a state of confused and noisy disturbance. .
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Earthquakes: 578...*a commotion, i.e. (of the air) a gale, (of the ground) an earthquake:--earthquake, tempest.*

Gale: Oxford Dictionary *n* 1.*a very strong wind. 2.a burst of sound, especially of laughter.*

Tempest: Merriam-Webster *n.* 1 : a violent storm. 2 : tumult, uproar.

Isa 28:2 Behold, the Lord hath a mighty and strong one, which as a tempest of hail and a destroying storm, as a flood of mighty waters overflowing, shall cast down to the earth with the hand.

Isa 29:6 Thou shalt be visited of the LORD of hosts with thunder, and with earthquake, and great noise, with storm and tempest, and the flame of devouring fire.

Eze 38:9 Thou shalt ascend and come like a storm, thou shalt be like a cloud to cover the land, thou, and all thy bands, and many people with thee.

Na 1:3 The LORD is slow to anger, and great in power, and will not at all acquit the wicked: the LORD hath his way in the whirlwind and in the storm, and the clouds are the dust of his feet.

Diverse: 2596. kata, kat-ah' a primary particle; (prepositionally) down (in place or time),... against,...(concerning, pertaining to touching), (dai-)ly,... X uttermost...and frequently denotes opposition, distribution, or intensity.

Diverse: Oxford Dictionary 1.showing a great deal of variety; very different.
2. including or involving people from a range of different social and ethnic backgrounds and of different genders, sexual orientations, etc.

Places: 5117 *topos*, *top'-os* apparently a primary word; a spot (general in space, but limited by occupancy; whereas 5561 is a large but participle locality), i.e. location (as a position, home, tract, etc.); figuratively, condition...coast...place, X plain...rock, room, where.

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5561 *chora*, *kho'*- feminine of a derivative of the base of 5490 through the idea of empty expanse; room, i.e. a space of territory (more or less extensive; often including its inhabitants):--**coast, county, fields**, ground, land, region...

5490 *chasma*, *khas'*-mah from a form of an obsolete primary *chao* (to "gape" or "yawn"); a "**chasm**" or vacancy (*impassable interval*):--gulf.

Chasm: Oxford Dictionary *n* 1. a deep fissure in the earth, rock, or another surface. 2. **a profound difference between people, viewpoints, feelings**, etc.

Lu 16:25,26 But Abraham said, Son, remember that thou in thy lifetime receivedst thy good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things: but now he is comforted, and thou art tormented.
